**RE:** A FIRST LOOK AT THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY RACE FOR KENTUCKY GOVERNOR

### WHAT WE DID

Meeting Street Insights conducted a survey among 500 Republican Primary voters in Kentucky. The survey was completed January 9-11, 2023, using a mix of live cell phone, landline interviewing, and text-to-web interviewing. The margin of error for a sample size of N=500 is plus or minus 4.38 percentage points.

### WHAT WE LEARNED

**#1 | Attorney General Daniel Cameron begins the race with an impressive image rating that far outpaces the other candidates tested.** Eight out of ten (81%) Republican primary voters say they have heard of Cameron and 62% view him favorably (only 8% unfavorably). By comparison, the favorable image ratings for the other candidates tested are less than half of Cameron's.

- Daniel Cameron's favorables are even higher among the voter groups that matter more in a Republican primary. Fully, 66% of Base Republicans (self-identified strong Republicans) view him favorably, as do 68% of pro-lifers, 67% of born again and evangelical Christians, and 65% of NRA supporters.

**#2 | Former President Donald Trump remains popular among Kentucky's Republican primary voters.** Fully, 79% of primary voters view Trump favorably, while 19% view him unfavorably. Among Base Republicans, Trump's favorables grow to 88%.



**#3 | Daniel Cameron has a commanding 31-point lead on the Republican primary ballot.** Cameron sits atop the ballot at 39%, with the next closest candidate only garnering 8% (Quarles: 8% / Craft: 8%). Deters and Harmon both receive 2%, Keck 1%, and the remaining six candidates get a combined 2% of the vote\*. Overall, 38% are undecided.

- Similar to his image ratings, Cameron holds strong leads among several key Republican primary constituencies. His lead expands among Base Republicans (42% Cameron, 7% Craft, 7% Quarles, 2% Deters, 1% Harmon, 1% Keck), pro-Life voters (44% Cameron, 8% Quarles, 7% Craft, 2% Deters, 2% Harmon, 1% Keck), NRA supporters (42% Cameron, 7% Craft, 7% Quarles, 2% Deters, 1% Harmon, 1% Keck), and evangelicals (42% Cameron, 9% Quarles, 7% Craft, 2% Harmon, 2% Keck, 1% Deters).
- Cameron also hits 40% on the ballot test among consistent Republican primary voters – those who have voted in all three of the last primary elections: 40% Cameron, 17% Quarles, 9% Craft, 1% Deters, 1% Harmon, and 1% Keck.
- Among Trump supporters, Cameron’s lead widens to 37 points: 44% Cameron, 7% Craft, 5% Quarles, 3% Deters, 2% Harmon, and 1% Keck.
- Despite Kelly Craft’s early ad blitz, among the 25% of the electorate that has formed an opinion of both Craft and Cameron, the Attorney General continues to run far ahead of his competitors: 46% Cameron, 15% Craft, 12% Quarles, 2% Deters, 2% Harmon, and 2% Keck.

## THE BOTTOM LINE

The data is crystal clear: Daniel Cameron is the best known and best positioned candidate in the Republican primary race for Governor. Cameron is well-known and well-liked among primary voters, and voters give him a 31-point lead over his closest opponent.
